For centuries people have covered their faces for different reasons. Bandannas or neckerchiefs were worn by cowboys and working men and were very useful. A few of them are:

* If they were in a dust storm or a snow storm they could protect their face.

* They could be used as a tourniquet or bandage if they were hurt, or to tie on a splint.

* It was used as a washcloth or towel.

* It was used to signal someone or as a trail marker.

* You could tie the corners together and make a little basket with it to feed oats to your horse, or gather berries or eggs.
