A May 22 tornado that devastated the nearby town of Windsor and left a broad path of destruction spanning northward from Greeley to the Wyoming border left the Bee Familv Centennial Farm Museum relatively scathed. The high winds blew the roof off of a small cow shed and inflicted minor damage on other buildings. As well, the tornado left large tree

branches and limbs scattered about the complex. Thankfully, no one was injured at the museum and all of the damage was easily repaired.
